What an exciting week we had last week. The chicks hatched and we ended up with 23. Wow! It was a great experience for the students. Our field trip was a bit dreary on the outside but our inside bubbly selves were as excited as always. Thanks to all the moms that came along. The museum and zoo were awesome. Using our umbrellas and boots added to our fun. The armadillo was so interesting. Favorites included the huge rhino, the up close lion, lemurs, the giant python, the bat cave and the giraffes. The museum provided water play and piping, lots of ways to explore balls, Brio land, a town to explore and pretend, the butterfly wall, the movie theater with costumes and back drops to make a movie, tractors and loaders to drive, dump and explore levers and buttons, a chicken coop to climb in, cows to milk, wheel barrels to load and push, a Lego room, sand porch and a musical bridge.

The children are to start picking a few stories in our Readers that they might like to read for graduation.

We are working on our poems and memory verses. Graduation is on Wed. May 25th at 2:00 in the sanctuary and refreshment following in the gym.

This week we are using stories with addition and/or subtraction facts. We will make tally marks for numbers and write our number words. Before and after numbers will be reviewed. Before numbers are still tricky. Keep working at home with those. Students will write the correct addition or subtraction fact when shown a concept card. We will review clocks and count coin combination nickel and pennies. The ten addition family will be introduced. There will be an evaluation.

In Phonics we will read and write some of the color words. We will make words with blends and spell them. There will be a written and oral evaluation. We will think of and write words which begin with our special sounds and spell them the way they sound. Sentences will be completed with words we choose. We will review special sounds and blends.

In Bible we will learn about Paul and Silas. They worshipped and praised God in prison. Where can we worship and praise God? Worship is our present to God. God wants us to tell him about our day, the good and the not so good things that happen. Paul and Silas were rescued from their sins and Jesus was their Savior. The ABC's of faith will be reviewed. We will read in Revelation 7: 9-12 of the description of heaven. We will discuss what that will be like. Our memory verse is "Praise the Lord. How good it is to sing praises to our God, how pleasant and fitting to praise Him!" Psalm 147:1

Following is the essay Anna Grey submitted to the local Elks Lodge. She won 1st place in the local, 1st place in the district, and 2nd place in state. Congratulations to Anna on a wonderful accomplishment!

"Every morning when I wake up, I make choices. I choose to attend a Christian school to practice my beliefs; I choose to speak publicly to express my opinion; I choose to follow news because we have free press; and I choose to assemble and petition when my rights are in danger. The 1st Amendment guarantees me all those rights, and thereby protects my freedom.

On the other side of the world there are people living under dictatorships. Every morning when they wake, the only choices they have are to obey their government or suffer the consequences. Death is on their shoulders. From the time they are little, they are taken away from their families. Their government chooses what they will do and what they are taught and they learn to trust no one. Communism is reaching its goal by tearing apart the family unit. The all still have a human right to believe and choose in anything they want, but their actions are stifled by mistrust, and dishonesty.

Our fore fathers formed one nation, even with their differences of opinion. They desired the freedoms of religion, speech, and the press, and the rights of assembly and petition. Winning their ultimate goal, they formed a strong government. they wrote and agreed upon a document, the Bill of Rights that would be the foundation of our Constitution, government, and nation. If the Bill of Rights had not been passed, we wouldn't be living in a federal government, but possibly instead a communistic one.

It all started with our fore fathers who came from a government that controlled their freedom of religion. We as Americans can worship any time and day of the week, and practice our religions and beliefs, or not practice anything at all. Our government does not control where we practice our religion, or where we don't. We do not have to go underground to hide what we believe in. If ever our rights of religion are taken away, we'd become what many nations of the world have become: godless and enslaved to their government.

The freedom of speech gives us the right to express our feelings and opinions. Our fore fathers were trying to pull out of the British tradition, of not having a voice. We are Americans are given a voice; we can publicly proclaim our opinions for or against our government through free press and rights of assembly and petition. In a communistic country one can become a literal target by publicly criticizing the government. Without our freedom of speech, we could be completely controlled by our government.

The comparison between America and a communistic country is real. I am so thankful for America, that I am still able to have my freedoms through the 1st Amendment. History has shown how Communism has failed, and what it has done. So we as Americans should not take for granted the freedoms we have, but rather thank God for them and exercise them."
